

Dear Parents and Carers,

We ask that you support our school's policy and refrain from allowing your child to bring water pistols or similar items onto school premises. We appreciate your understanding and cooperation in helping us maintain a safe and respectful learning environment for all our students.

Finally, I would also like to mention the importance of punctuality. In order to get lessons started at the beginning of the day please could you reiterate at home the importance of the students arriving in plenty of time so that their tutor time can begin promptly at 08:30. When the students start to become relaxed about not being at school on time it delays the start of learning and inevitably means negative interactions with teaching staff before their day has properly started. This promptness also needs to continue through every lesson in the day, and again we are grateful for any support you can give by discussing the importance of punctuality with your young person at home.
