Year 10 and 11 Students Explore Berlin - A Memorable 2025 Trip

From Friday 31st October to Monday 3rd November, 59 of our Year 10 and 11 students embarked on an unforgettable educational trip to Berlin, combining history, culture, and sightseeing.

The adventure began with a flight from Heathrow on Friday, culminating in an evening visit to the iconic TV Tower, where students enjoyed panoramic views of the city as night fell. Saturday provided a more reflective experience with a visit to Sachsenhausen Concentration Camp. Our students engaged thoughtfully with the history, asking insightful questions and showing great respect for the site.





The afternoon offered a chance to relax with a scenic boat trip along the River Spree, taking in Berlin's striking architecture and landmarks from the water.





On Sunday, the group explored some of Berlin's most famous cultural and historical sites, including the East Side Gallery, the Olympic Stadium, Checkpoint Charlie, and the Jewish Museum. Students were able to connect classroom learning with the city's rich history, gaining deeper insight into Germany's past and present.

Monday's itinerary included visits to Potsdamer Platz, the Memorial to the Murdered Jews of Europe, and the Bundestag before the group departed for the airport. These final visits provided a fitting conclusion to a trip that was both educational and inspiring.






The 2025 Berlin trip offered students a unique opportunity to experience history firsthand, develop a greater understanding of German culture, and create lasting memories.
